# Request Articles Direct

Using the library's website you can request articles of interest directly from your search of the OVID databases (Medline, Cinahl, PsycINFO, EMBASE, EBM Reviews) through CIAP. Follow these simple steps to streamline your article ordering process.

1. Register as a user of this service at [www.gardinerlibrary.com/Finding.aspx?id=89](http://www.gardinerlibrary.com/Finding.aspx?id=89)
2. Perform your search using any of the OVID databases available via CIAP.
3. Mark the articles you want to order by placing a tick next to each reference.
4. Now that you have all the chosen references in their own set, select the Document Delivery link under the reference. (Figure 2.)

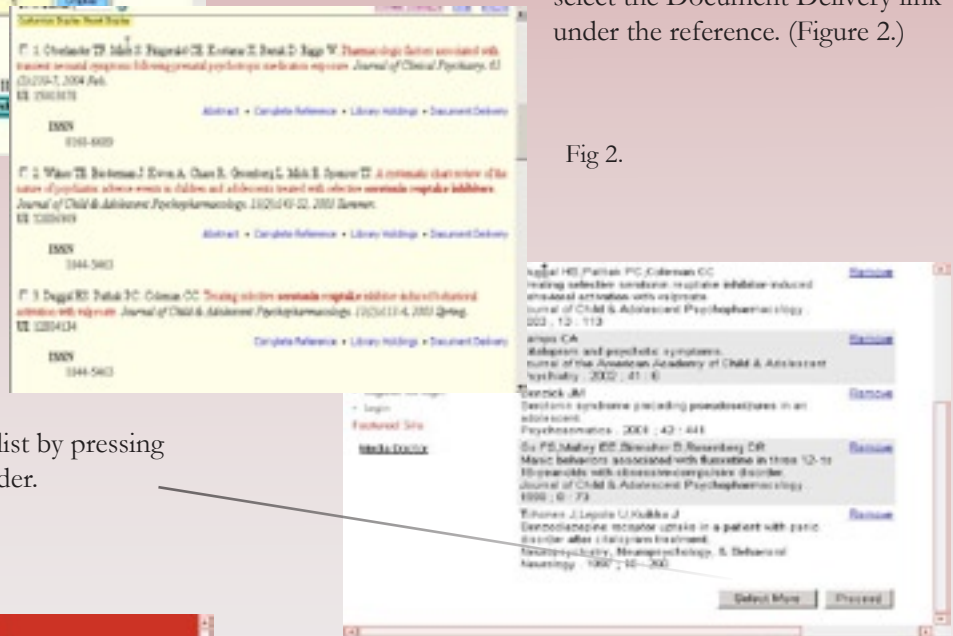

5. Build your requested articles list by pressing **Select More**, or **Proceed** to order. (Figure 3.)

6. Enter your username and password (nominated by you when registering for this service) and accept the Copyright conditions
7. Select a delivery method. To view a list of charges click [www.gardinerlibrary.com/Services.aspx?id=117](http://www.gardinerlibrary.com/Services.aspx?id=117)
8. You will be prompted to enter your departmental cost code or your credit card details (Figure 3.)

9. You will receive confirmation of your order as well as costs and a transaction number (Figure 5)
10. Articles will be sent to your nominated address. Books will be held in the library and you will be contacted to arrange pick-up.

## FullText Update

The Wellcome Trust, together with the Joint Information Systems Committee (JISC) and the US National Library of Medicine (NLM) have joined together to digitise the backfiles of a number of significant medical journals. These include, *Annals of Surgery*, *Biochemical Journal*, *Journal of Physiology* and *Medical History*.

The digitised content will be freely available on the Internet through PubMed Central. With funding of almost 1.25 million pounds the project will digitise over 1.7 million pages of text. The National Library of Medicine will manage the project and host the archive ensuring the digital files are preserved in perpetuity.

The first titles are expected to be available in early 2005 adding significantly to the body of medical literature available freely available on the Internet. Although the project focuses on digitising back files, publishers will also include new issues of the selected journals on an ongoing basis.

# Library Week 2004

Congratulations to all the prize winners and thank you to those of you who took part in GLS Library Week activities from 17-24 May.

Many staff attended our Web seminar where Client Services Librarian, Steve Mears, demonstrated some of the time saving and useful features of the library's website. Most stayed on to enjoy afternoon tea and to view Architects plans of the 'new' JHH library incorporating an Information Commons. Quizzes, puzzles and e-trivia proved ever popular, particularly 'Stump the Librarian' with many of you eager to put us to the test. 'Stump' has become a great way for us to learn about the topics that interest you. As a result of a request from Dr David Williams, Neurology JHH, we discovered a little bit about Lytico-Bodig, a rare neurodegenerative disease affecting the native people of Guam, the Chamorros.

## What is Lytico-Bodig?

Lytico is known in the medical literature as the Parkinsonism-dementia complex (PDC) of Guam. Bodig is the local name for amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS, or Lou Gehrig's Disease).

The disease shares many features with the three main age related neurodegenerative diseases, known elsewhere in the world – ALS, Alzheimer's Disease and Parkinson's Disease.

Lytico Bodig was first attributed to starvation diets common during WWII. The epidemic peaked in the 1950s but has been declining since. Several hundred cases are registered, with the at risk population 17,000.

The disease runs in families indicating a genetic component, yet the changing course of the epidemic suggests declining exposure to an environmental factor. To add to the puzzle, the disease is rare on neighbouring Saipan and the other Mariana Islands.

## Sweet orchidometer



A reader of the Medical Observer has found that a cheap and disposable alternative to expensive wooden orchidometers can be found in a box of Celebrations chocolate assortments.

The aptly named Teaser (a variant of the Malteaser) is identical in size and shape to the 8 ml orchidometer bead. As 8 ml is the 50<sup>th</sup> centile for testicular size at age 13 it was noted that puberty is proceeding in a satisfactory manner if the testes develop from smaller to the same size and then finally bigger than a Teaser.

## Radar: Killing Breast Cancer

American researchers investigating radar technology for the detection of space missiles may have stumbled on a treatment for breast cancer. Microwave energy is delivered to tumours in women with early stage breast cancer, prior to lumpectomy. Initial results have shown a 43% reduction in incidence rate of cancer cells found close to surgical margins.

While treating cancer with heat is not new, it has been difficult to treat tumours deep in the body: delivering heat to cancer cells and not overheating healthy tissue has, in the past, been problematic. The outpatient treatment uses a single needle probe to detect and measure parameters during treatment.
